

Village of Sodus Point Plans First Election Next Wednesday

SODUS POINT, Nov. 22 — The newly incorporated Village of Sodus Point will hold its first election for village offices on Wednesday, Nov. 27.

Sodus Pointers will elect a mayor, two trustees for a two-year term and two trustees for a one-year term. Besides Republican and Democratic candidates a third party has been organized, called the People's Progressive Party.

This third party consists of candidates who spearheaded the drive to incorporate Sodus Point as a village. Caucuses have been held by all three parties. The Progressive Party candidate for mayor is Henry Salze, a resident of Sodus Point for 12 years and presently owner and manager of a grocery store in the village. The Republicans have nominated George Arney Sr., resident of Sodus Point for the past 20 years and presently owner of a boat livery and fish market on Sodus Bay. The Democrats have nominated as their candidate for mayor Willis Raymer, resident of Sodus Point for the past 40 years and presently operator of a boat livery on Sodus Bay.

The candidates nominated for two year terms as trustees for the Progressive ticket are Eugene Cook Sr. and Ernest Kirkpatrick. Both candidates have resided in Sodus Point for past 30 years. Cook is superintendent of the Genesee Malt House at Sodus Point and a leader in the drive to incorporate this village. Democrats have also nominated Cook and Kirkpatrick as their candidates for trustees for two-year terms. Republicans have nominated John Buzzell Sr. and Dean Hunter for two terms as trustees. Both are residents of this village for the past 25 years. Buzzell is forman for the Pennsylvania Railroad and

Hunter operates a business in Newark.

Republican candidates for one-year terms as trustees are Elmer Kinde and Howard Linscott. Both have resided in Sodus Point for several years. The Democrats have nominated Walter Cross and Albert Curtis for one-year term trustees. Cross was born in Sodus Point, on Eagle Island, and has been foreman at the Genesee Malt House for past several years. Curtis has lived here three years. The Progressive ticket

has as one-year trustee candidates Dwight Andrews, a grocery store manager in Sodus Point, and Tal Jones, head agent for the Pennsylvania Railroad in Sodus Point for the past six years.

Candidates say they are hopeful that all qualified voters will get out and vote. It is reported that there are up to 400 qualified voters eligible to vote. The election will be held in the Sodus Point Community House from 9 a.m. to 7 p.m. A voting machine will be used.

2 Non-Residents Quit Planning Commission

CANANDAIGUA, Nov. 22—Howard J. Samuels, Smith Road and Raymond A. Lake, West Lake Road, resigned last night from the City Planning Commission, claiming that public references to their residence outside the city was the principal factor in their decision.

The question of members of city boards living outside the city limits and continuing to serve on official groups was raised prominently during the last election campaign with Democratic candidates claiming that it was illegal and improper.

"In view of the fact that some people," Samuels said in a letter to the Common Council, "have questioned the legality of anyone being a member of the Planning Commission who does not live within the city limits, I hereby submit my resignation.
